CHECK OUT THESE THREE OPTIONS THAT MANY STUDENTS USE TO SECURE FINANCIAL AID:

FIND THE FREE MONEY (AKA SCHOLARSHIPS)

A scholarship is money that you don't need to pay back. It can come from the government or a private entity. Don't have the greatest grades? Don't worry, they're offered for a variety of other achievements and talents as well.

THE IOU METHOD (AKA STUDENT LOANS)

Both the government and private financial institutions offer education loans. Federal loans tend to be more popular because of their low interest rates, different repayment options, and are easier to get.

A: A program that lets you earn money for college expenses through part-time work.

A: Fill out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

Q: Do all schools offer it?

A: No.

Q: If I'm approved, do I automatically get a job?

A: Some schools will pair you up with a job, but others require you to find your own. Contact your college's financial aid office to find out.

Q: Any insider tips to improve my chances?

A: The earlier you apply for work-study, the more likely you are to get it.
